Refugia Festival began as a bold idea: to create place-based programs featuring music performances, educational workshops, and community stewardship that celebrate the beauty of our natural soundscapes and advocate for their preservation. Since its inaugural season in 2024 at Nichols Arboretum, the festival has brought together artists, scientists, and community members to celebrate soundscapes as essential to both cultural expression and ecological health. Born out of my doctoral research on the relationships between our human-made music and the music of the Living Earth, Refugia Festival has already inspired audiences to listen to their environment in new ways.

Often taking inspiration from nature and natural phenomena, she combines field recordings, synths, software, and gestural interfaces to perform works that invite audience participation. She has performed at a variety of festivals across the United States. She is the co-founder of both the Ambient Annotations experimental music series and the Reverberator experimental music festival in Lansing, MI.

## **Program:**

“From Dawn till Dusk//Dances and Duels”

This interactive performance will take audience members on a journey through Michigan’s natural spaces from dawn to dusk. Using a mixture of prompts and visualizations, perspective taking, field recordings, virtual synthesis, electromagnetic field listening, microphones and sensors, and audience participation, this performance will highlight the sonic dances and duels between humans and the environment. Audience participation is highly encouraged.

# Bill Rapai



Bill Rapai is executive director of the Kirtland's Warbler Alliance and a member of the Kirtland's Warbler Conservation Team. The Alliance's mission is to facilitate connections between people, the jack pine ecosystem, and the Kirtland's Warbler to ensure the long-term conservation of the rarest migratory songbird in North America. Among his responsibilities is identifying, training and deploying volunteers to help with a census that monitors the health of the population by counting birds by listening for their song.

He is a former newspaper editor (Detroit Free Press and The Boston Globe) and the author of three books, including The Kirtland's Warbler: The story of a bird's fight against extinction and the people who saved it, published by University of Michigan Press.

## **Program:**

"Using birdsong to monitor the population of Kirtland's Warbler"

The Kirtland's Warbler, once on the brink of extinction, is among North America's rarest migratory songbirds. This workshop invites participants to explore the bird's story through sound—hearing its distinctive song alongside other voices of the jack pine ecosystem. Through guided listening and a demonstration of census protocols that helped save the species, we reflect on the challenges of fieldwork, the resilience of fragile habitats, and why this one bird matters.

## Block 1 Program

### “Microcosmos” - Josh Epperly

"Microcosmos" is a piece composed entirely for electric guitar. "Microcosmos" was inspired by the songs of cicadas and crickets, whose choruses are a defining and joyful characteristic of Michigan summers. For me, their songs are also portals into deep time. Cicadas and crickets were the first terrestrial species to evolve mechanisms for sonic communication. Cricket wings with sound-making structures first started appearing in the fossil records nearly 300 million years ago, at the end of the Paleozoic Era. Before these insects, the only sounds on Earth were of wind, water, and geologic activity. “Microcosmos” is meant to take the listener on a journey through geologic time, starting quietly with field recordings of these insects and ending with the loud, seismic activity of an Earth before the introduction of song.



Our seasonal workshops on seed collection, stratification, and cultivation techniques foster both practical planting experience and a deeper understanding of local biodiversity. # David Clipner



David Clipner is the lead faculty member for the Music Production & Audio Engineering program at Washtenaw Community College in the Digital Media Arts Department. He also serves as Director of Education & Wildlife at the Ann Arbor Hands-On Museum and Leslie Science & Nature Center, where he oversees programming and live animal training and welfare. Through his family's business, Copper Bear Shire, he and his wife teach homesteading skills and provide services such as native habitat landscaping, doula/birth work, and audio production/recording. One way he looks to make connections between his multiple interests is with his artistic and research-based projects, where he focuses on merging applied behavior analysis and conservation psychology with multimedia performance and exhibition to create thought-provoking experiences that inspire positive behavioral changes.

## **Program:**

“Sound Mapping for Wildlife Welfare”

David will be sharing some of his current work, where he is collecting a large amount of varied data in order to help determine potentially overlooked variables that may affect stress levels and ultimately training plans for captive animals utilized for conservation education. By sharing a unique perspective for habitat design, he hopes to improve the life and welfare of captive animals both under his care and throughout multiple industries.

White Flowers is a string ensemble that came out of Autophysiopsychic Millennium's theatrical performance *Something Else in the Garden*, based on Dr. Yusef Lateef's novella, *Night in the Garden of Love*.

Autophysiopsychic Millennium (APPM) is a Black-led creative research and performance collective that explores, experiment, and studies the music philosophy and spiritual works of world-renowned multi-instrumentalist musician, composer, author, visual artist, professor, Afro-Futurist, and Detroit native, Dr. Yusef Lateef.

White Flowers integrates musical compositions based on environmental themes and climate consciousness to initiate a cultural discourse around climate change and the importance of addressing it before it's irreversible. These are themes discussed in Dr. Lateef's *Night in the Garden of Love*, which is set on a dying Earth due to human destruction and corruption. These compositions will engage deep human emotions to connect with climate change issues through a social, political, and cultural lens. They will serve as a platform to highlight the gravity of the climate emergency.


## **Program:**

“Listening After Natural Disasters”

This workshop invites participants to reflect on the August 24, 2023 storm that caused extensive damage to the Nichols Arboretum. Together, we will explore the emotional and ecological impact of such events through shared listening and dialogue. Participants will be invited to complete an ecological grief survey before engaging in a guided listening exercise supported by a companion zine. The session will conclude with an open discussion on how we process natural disasters and changing landscapes. As a gesture of renewal, each participant will receive a small biodegradable bag of mulch—created from the ashes of fallen trees in the Arb—to bring home and nourish their own gardens.

“Desire, Desire” is a painting depicting a collage of natural imagery appearing in man-made objects, from abstracted ammonite textures from the CD disk of The Sundays’ album “Reading, Writing, and Arithmetic,” to flowers and dots present in a quilted fabric square. The digital collage reference was assembled using selective Photoshop filters that abstracted, distorted, and changed the characteristics of each image. In this way, the naturally-occurring and the man-made blur into an amalgamation of what is appreciation of nature versus what is simply already growing without human influence.

### BJ Jarvis



## Field Resonances Artists

### Monarch Waystation Soundmap - Alex Wand

Monarch Waystation Soundmap documents long-distance cycling expeditions that trace the migratory routes of the threatened Western monarch butterfly. During month-long journeys from the Pacific Northwest to California's Central Coast, we establish butterfly waystations by sowing milkweed seeds—an essential food source for monarchs—on roadsides and underutilized land, while creating geotagged musical responses to each site through field recordings and performances.

The film investigates how music practices might contribute to multispecies flourishing. Through specialized recording equipment including electromagnetic sensors and geophones, combined with contemplative listening techniques we call "Sense-able Sonic Practices," the project explores the monarch's perceptual world and reveals new ways for people to access modes of awareness that work toward the ongoingness of threatened species. MWS demonstrates how creative practice can function as both habitat restoration and a vehicle for cultivating ecological awareness across species boundaries.

Created in collaboration with filmmaker Kyle Baker, dancer/choreographer Jessica Hemingway, and musician/visual artist Lydia Barrett, the film weaves together field recordings, original compositions, dance, and stop-motion animation to tell the story of this multispecies collaboration.
